FALL LEAF PICKUP SCHEDULE

Leaf pickup will take place each week on **Mondays** and **Tuesdays** beginning October 5th and 6th and run through December 7th and 8th.

Reminders are as follows:

Leaves **must be** bagged in biodegradable leaf bags and placed curbside by 7AM of the day of pickup. **No alley pickups** except in Holliday Hills.

Twigs, 3 inches and less in diameter, **must be bundled and tied.** (No wire.)

Pickup to the **EAST** of Penn Street, including the east side of Penn Street, in the Borough will be **on Mondays.**

Leaf pickup to the **WEST** of Penn Street, Gaysport, and Holliday Hills, in the Borough will be **on Tuesdays.**

There is no need to call to schedule pickup. Bags that contain recyclables or bags that are taped or stapled **will not be picked up** (simply fold the top of the bag over).

If items are missed, the pickup will occur the **next week.**

A dripping faucet, a toilet running periodically, a garden hose that does not shut off completely are just a few items that can cause your water and sewer bills to increase. If you think that you may have a leak, please contact the Water Department at 696-0623 to schedule an appointment for one of the Public Works Employees to come and check your home for any leaks.

WHAT IS INFILTRATION /INFLOW (I/I)?

Excess water that flows into sewer pipes from groundwater and stormwater is called infiltration and inflow, or I/I. Groundwater (infiltration) seeps into sewer pipes through holes, cracks, joint failures, and faulty connections. Stormwater (inflow) rapidly flows into sewers via roof drain downspouts, foundation drains, storm drain cross-connections, and through holes in manhole covers. Most I/I is caused by aging infrastructure that needs maintenance or replacement.

Infiltration is groundwater, or groundwater that is influenced by surface water, that enters sewer pipes (interceptors, collectors, manholes (MH), or side sewers) through holes, breaks, joint failures, connection failures and other openings. Infiltration quantities often exhibit seasonal variation in response to groundwater levels. Storm events can trigger a rise in groundwater levels and increase infiltration flows. The highest infiltration flows are observed following significant storm events or following prolonged periods of precipitation.

Inflow is surface water that enters the wastewater system from yard, roof and footing drains, from cross-connections with storm drains, downspouts and sump pumps. Inflow occurs as a result of storm events such as rainfall, snowfall, springs or snow melt that contribute to excessive sewer flows. Peak inflow can occur during heavy storm events when storm sewer systems are surcharged, resulting in hydraulic backups and local ponding. Inflow and infiltration is clear water that enters the sanitary sewer system from a variety of sources.

Why is I/I a problem?

Extra water in the sewer system is a problem because:

It takes up capacity in the sewer pipes and ends up at the regional wastewater treatment plant where it must be treated like sewage, resulting in higher treatment costs.

Requires new and larger wastewater facilities to convey and treat larger volumes of flow, resulting in higher capital expenditures.

I/I flows contribute to sewer system overflows into local homes and the region's waterways, negatively impacting public health and the environment. It is estimate that inflow and infiltration makes up 75 percent of peak flows during winter and rain events and much of this comes from private property.

Protecting the environment and decreasing wastewater treatment costs are the benefit of a regional I/I control program.

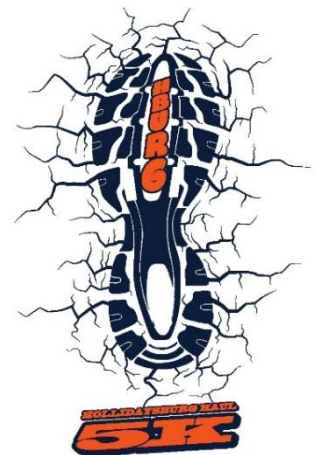
Enjoy this flat out and back course through the Historic District and surrounding areas in the Borough. Each 5K

Be a courteous and responsible pet walker and clean up after your pet!

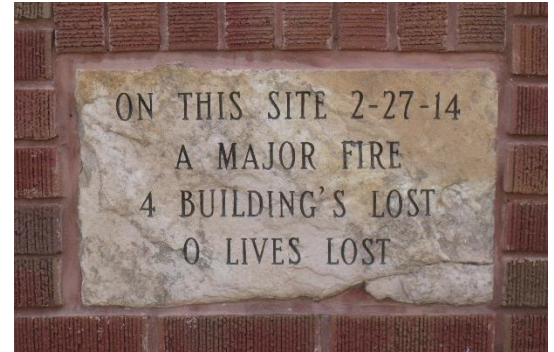


N. GRANT NICKLAS AWARDED

The Hollidaysburg Historic Preservation Commission (HPC) announced the recipient of the 2014 Grant Nicklas Award for excellence in historic restoration works in the borough.

Hollidaysburg businessman Arnold “Buster” Brunner received the annual award for his restoration of the brick façade at 113 Allegheny Street, soon after a devastating fire in February 2014 destroyed the adjacent four buildings. Mr Brunner also commissioned a memorial plaque to install into the restored wall, visible from some distance along Allegheny Street.

The Borough Council established the award to honor the memory of N. Grant Nicklas, Jr. who was instrumental in the establishment of Hollidaysburg’s Historic District. Nicklas then served as Chairman of the Historical and Architectural Review Board from its beginning in 1989 until his death on May 17, 1995.



IT IS PENNSYLVANIA LAW!



The Borough takes tremendous pride in the fact that its residents are consistently doing projects to take care of and maintain their homes. It is one of the great attributes of Hollidaysburg.

Be mindful that Pennsylvania State Law requires that you must obtain appropriate permits to have certain types of projects done.

Not obtaining the necessary permits could lead to legal action and fines.

Zoning permits from the Borough may also be necessary. Be sure to make the phone call before your project begins to ensure that the project progresses in a timely manner and that you will not find yourself faced with penalties.
