SPRING BRUSH PICKUP TO BEGIN IN THE BOROUGH

The Borough will begin brush pickup this year in **April**. Pickup will begin on Monday, **April 3, 2023** and continue **EACH WEEK** through **Tuesday, May 23, 2023**.

Throughout that time, Borough workers will pick up and haul away compostable waste such as: dead leaves, dead plant material, tree and brush trimmings and branches up to 3" in diameter and 6' in length. Brush and branches must be bundled with string or twine. Please do not use wire to bundle. Items that will not be picked up are: stone, garbage, gravel, dirt, junk, and appliances.

Borough crews will pick up all brush and bags on the **East** side of **Penn Street** every **Monday** and items will be picked up on the **West** side of **Penn Street** every **Tuesday**.

If your items were not set out in time or they were missed, they will be picked up the **FOLLOWING WEEK**. Items must be placed curbside **by 7:00 am**, and the only alley pickups will be **Sweet Cherry Court** in Holliday Hills.

SIDEWALK GRANTS

Hollidaysburg Borough Council has authorized a grant program for all residents and property owners.

This grant will reimburse the property owner 25% of the cost of replacement or installation of a pedestrian sidewalk located along a public street.

Applications will be reviewed in the order received. The program will remain open until funds are exhausted or until Council closes the program. Applications are available at the Borough Building, **401 Blair Street**, during regular office hours



BUILDING & ZONING PERMITS



In the planning for construction projects requiring permits, please keep in mind it's the property owner's responsibility to make application for the permit. The property owner may have their contractor make application if granting them permission to do so as an Authorized Agent. The signatory block on the Borough Building and Zoning Permit Application has an acknowledgment statement certifying the proposed work has been authorized by the owner of record and that authorization has been granted by the owner to the agent to make application.

If work requiring a building and zoning permit has commenced without a permit, it is the property owner's responsibility to secure the permit. The contractor may apply for the permit only if authorized by the property owner to do so.

Hollidaysburg Area Art Council's **Summer Art Camp** "Art in the Park" will take place at Canal Basin Park, 101 Canal Street, Hollidaysburg.

STREET TREE PRUNING

RAVE ALERT





The **RAVE alert system** is a rapid notification system. The Borough uses this to alert residents to possible water outages, disruptions, etc. This is how it works: water customers provide a good contact phone number to the water billing office that they wish to have added to the call list. This can be a property owner/account holder, or tenant. In the case of an apartment building, as long as there are separate meters per tenant, each one may enroll in the RAVE alert system. If there is one meter, one number may be enrolled. Alerts are usually "sent out" at 5:00 pm on the day before the outage or **disruption is to take place**. The alert will be a recorded message. Keep in mind that once you enroll, if you get a new phone number, you will need to update the information with the Borough. Contact the water billing office at (814) 696-0623.

BE ON THE LOOKOUT FOR LEAKS

As you can see from the chart below it does not take much of a leak to use a lot of water. A dripping faucet, a toilet running periodically, a garden hose that does not shut off completely are just a few items that can cause your water and sewer bills to increase. If you think you may have a leak, please contact the Water Department at 814-696-0623 to schedule an appointment for one of the Public Works employees to come and check your home for any leaks.


Televisions and other electronics are <u>NOT</u> permitted to be disposed of with your regular trash.

What is Infiltration and Inflow (I/I)?

Infiltration is groundwater, or groundwater that is influenced by surface water, which enters sewer pipes (interceptors, collectors, manholes, or side sewers) through holes, breaks, joint failures, connection failures and other openings. Infiltration quantities often exhibit seasonal variation in response to groundwater levels. Storm events can trigger a rise in groundwater levels and increase infiltration flows. The highest infiltration flows are observed following significant storm events or following prolonged periods of precipitation.

Inflow is surface water that enters the wastewater system from yard, roof and footer drains, from cross-connections with storm drains, downspouts and sump pumps. Inflow occurs as a result of storm events such as rainfall, and snow melt, or underground springs that contribute to excessive sewer flows. Peak inflow can occur during heavy storm events when storm sewer systems are surcharged, resulting in hydraulic backups and local ponding. Inflow and infiltration is clear water that enters the sanitary sewer system from a variety of sources.

Infiltration occurs when groundwater seeps into sewer pipes through cracks, leaky pipe joints and/or deteriorated manholes.

Inflow occurs in direct proportion to the amount of rainfall. Inflow is storm water that enters the wastewater system through rain leaders, basement sump pumps or foundation drains that are illegally connected directly to a sanitary sewer pipe.

Why is I/I a problem?

I/I ends up at the regional wastewater treatment plant, where it must be treated like sewage, resulting in higher treatment costs.

I/I often requires new and larger wastewater treatment facilities

, conveyance systems or holding tanks to convey, store and treat larger volumes of flow. This additional infrastructure results in higher capital expenditures.

I/I flows contribute to sewer system surcharging into local homes and overflows into the region's waterways (CSOs), negatively impacting public health and the environment. It is estimated that inflow and infiltration make up 85 percent of peak flows during winter and rain events and as much as 70 percent of this peak flow comes from privately owned sewer networks.

Protecting the environment and decreasing wastewater treatment costs are the benefit of a responsible I/I control program.
