FALL BRUSH PICKUP SCHEDULE

Leaf pickup will take place each week on Mondays and Tuesdays beginning October 2nd and 3rd and run through December 4th and 5th.

Reminders are as follows:

Leaves **must be bagged** in biodegradable leaf bags and placed curbside by 7AM of the day of pickup. **No alley pickups** except in Holliday Hills.

Twigs, 3 inches and less in diameter, **must be bundled and tied.** (No wire.)

Pickup to the **EAST** of Penn Street, including the east side of Penn Street, in the Borough will be **on Mondays.**

Leaf pickup to the **WEST** of Penn Street, Gaysport, and Holliday Hills, in the Borough will be **on Tuesdays.**

There is no need to call to schedule pickup. Bags that contain recyclables or bags that are taped or stapled **will not be picked up** (simply fold the top of the bag over).

If items are missed, the pickup will occur the **next week. No exceptions!**

BE ON THE LOOKOUT FOR LEAKS!

This chart shows that it does not take much of a leak to use a lot of water!

A dripping faucet, a running toilet, or a garden hose that does not shut off completely are some conditions that can cause water and sewer bills to increase. If you suspect that you may have a leak, please contact the Water Department at **696-0623** to schedule an appointment to have your home investigated for leaks. There is no charge to have this check performed.

WHAT IS INFILTRATION /INFLOW (I/I)?

Excess water that flows into sewer pipes from groundwater and stormwater is called infiltration and inflow, or I/I. Groundwater (infiltration) seeps into sewer pipes through holes, cracks, joint failures, and faulty connections. Stormwater (inflow) rapidly flows into sewers via roof drain downspouts, foundation drains, storm drain cross-connections, and through holes in manhole covers. Most I/I is caused by aging infrastructure that needs maintenance or replacement.

Infiltration is groundwater, or groundwater that is influenced by surface water that enters sewer pipes (interceptors, collectors, manholes (MH), or side sewers) through holes, breaks, joint failures, connection failures and other openings. Infiltration quantities often exhibit seasonal variation in response to groundwater levels. Storm events can trigger a rise in groundwater levels and increase infiltration flows. The highest infiltration flows are observed following significant storm events or following prolonged periods of precipitation.

Inflow is surface water that enters the wastewater system from yard, roof and footing drains, from cross-connections with storm drains, downspouts and sump pumps. Inflow occurs as a result of storm events such as rainfall, snowfall, springs or snow melt that contribute to excessive sewer flows. Peak inflow can occur during heavy storm events when storm sewer systems are surcharged, resulting in hydraulic backups and local ponding. Inflow and infiltration is clear water that enters the sanitary sewer system from a variety of sources.

Why is I/I a problem?

Extra water in the sewer system is a problem because:

It takes up capacity in the sewer pipes and ends up at the regional wastewater treatment plant where it must be treated like sewage, resulting in higher treatment costs.

Requires new and larger wastewater facilities to convey and treat larger volumes of flow, resulting in higher capital expenditures.

I/I flows contribute to sewer system overflows into local homes and the region's waterways, negatively impacting public health and the environment. It is estimate that inflow and infiltration makes up 75 percent of peak flows during winter and rain events and much of this comes from private property.

Protecting the environment and decreasing wastewater treatment costs are the benefit of a regional I/I control program.

STORMWATER MANAGEMENT PRACTICES

What is stormwater? Stormwater is water that runs off the land after precipitation, rain or snowmelt. Runoff occurs in natural, undeveloped areas; typically only for larger storms. After development, the natural areas are replaced with roofs, driveways, sidewalks and streets. These hard surfaces do not allow water to drain through them as they do in natural settings, such as soil. The water in developed areas runs off instead of infiltrating into the soil or being taken up by vegetation. Rainwater from homes, driveways, or yard may end up in the storm drains. These storm drain pipes carry that runoff and its pollutants to streams. **What are impacts of runoff?** The negative impacts of stormwater runoff can include flooding, erosion of streams, sediment build up in lakes and pollution of streams and lakes. Stormwater runoff can cause streams to become wider, deeper, and straighter, losing their natural meanders and decreasing habitat for fish and other animals that live in streams. Stormwater can also be hotter than natural stream sources. Warmer water holds less dissolved oxygen which can be harmful to fish like trout. **What are homeowners' responsibilities?** Homeowners need to be aware of best stormwater maintenance practices. Best Management Practices, (BMP), includes the use of detention basins, as well as protecting open space to manage stormwater. The goal of BMPs is to reduce the impact of development on downstream streams and lakes.

This can be accomplished by:

- minimizing the amount of runoff,
- slowing down runoff,
- infiltrating runoff,
- evapotranspiring runoff, or
- filtering runoff.

Vegetative growth helps to put water back into the atmosphere, and helps the water infiltrate into the ground. Native vegetation is the best choice for maintaining stormwater because they are naturally adapted to the soils and the climate. **What are Stormwater Regulations?** When a property is developed, stormwater management facilities must be incorporated. Erosion and sediment control methods must be used during construction. When the construction is completed, post construction stormwater management practices will have been constructed and the developer must provide a plan for these to be maintained over time.
